Doctors Losing patients to Medicare Advantage

Question: Why are physicians losing patients to Medicare Advantage when patients turn 65?

Answer: A policy known as seamless conversion allows insurance companies to move members of their commercial or Medicaid managed-care plans over to Medicare Advantage plans if they first ask permission from the CMS. The Medicare Advantage plans mean more revenue for insurers, but it often means patients' doctors will be considered out of network. The CMS believes the transition to Medicare Advantage should be implemented to ensure continuity of care and recently issued a memo to insurers reminding them about seamless conversion as a way to transition enrollees. In a letter to the CMS, the Medical Society of New Jersey called out the agency noting that "seamless conversion merely insures that carriers keep their member base: it does not facilitate continuity of care; it does not facilitate the patient-physician relationship." The concern among many healthcare providers is that the CMS' seamless conversion is not as advantageous to patients as it is to its insurers and financial interests. Physicians nationwide have been critical of the secrecy of the plan as well and some groups are pushing for the CMS to publicly release information on which Medicare Advantage plans have been approved. The goal of assuring a continuity of care seems contradicted when a patient's non-Medicare insurance has been covering their care at a practice but the practice is not in the Medicare Advantage plan's network. It has been rumored that Aetna, Humana and UnitedHealthcare have asked for permission to participate in seamless conversion. Patient advocacy groups are also pushing against this policy and requesting that the CMS require insurers to get confirmation from a beneficiary that they understand their network may have changed and allow for a special enrollment period in case their doctors are not in network.

In response to the criticism, the CMS countered that beneficiaries should be more vigilant in opening and reviewing all mail from their current insurer. The CMS further shifted the onus on enrollees to make sure to ask about provider and pharmacy networks and noted that patients can opt out of Medicare Advantage plans. The CMS has also said that it will make public which insurers use seamless conversion later this year.

CMS Announces MACRA Refinements : Although final regulations have yet to be promulgated under the Medicare Access and CHIP Reauthorization Act ("MACRA"), and are not scheduled to be issued until November, 2016, in a recent blog post, Andrew Slavitt, the Acting Administrator of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services ("CMS"), announced options which physicians could select in order to comply with the Merit-based Incentive Payment System ("MIPS"). MIPS will replace meaningful use, the physician quality reporting system ("PQRS") and the value-based modified programs. Although MIPS does not go into effect until 2019, reporting is set to begin on January 1, 2017. The proposed rule requires providers to report and participate in the entire program for the whole year, beginning on January 1, 2017, which could allow the provider to receive a "modest positive payment adjustment." However, the blog post advances two additional options. First, according to the blog post, a provider will be required to submit only "some data," and as long as "some data [is submitted] to the Quality Payment Program, including data from after January 1, 2017, you will avoid a negative payment adjustment." The other option is reporting for a reduced number of days, where providers could report for an unspecified shorter period during calendar year 2017 and still receive "a small positive payment adjustment." Physicians who qualify for participation in an Advanced Alternative Payment Model ("APM") will be exempt from MIPS; however, it is estimated that very few providers will qualify for this option.

Weekly Charting Tip:

It is not enough to actually go through the process of patient consent to a treatment. Protect yourself and have your patient sign a consent form. Please make sure that the form is signed and dated. Additionally, if you show a video or a chart to explain a treatment, have your patient sign a document that states that they saw/reviewed the presentation on whatever date in your office (if that is the case). In other words, document, document, document!

Commissioner's Corner

Originally appeared in the Poughkeepsie Journal on Sunday, October 9, 2016:

Heroin and opiate use, addiction and abuse is the most significant public health crisis of our day, affecting every background, income level, ethnicity and gender. This could not have been more clear at last month's Poughkeepsie Journal forum, underscoring the critical importance of everyone being involved as part of the solution to this crisis. Solutions require a comprehensive response from every level of government; reform to health insurance; address of the stigma; building of coalitions and stronger families; education; enforcement; treatment; and celebrating recovery. Dutchess County Government is aggressively helping in this struggle with a multi-faceted response ranging from the law enforcement efforts of our Drug Task Force to prevention and education efforts to assisting those gripped by addiction find their way to recovery. While there is much more to be done, the Journal's forum highlighted our need to make residents more aware of the resources available and steps they can take as individuals to prevent this epidemic from spreading further.

Our Dutchess County HELPLINE (845-485-9700) is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to connect you with a mental health counselor who can talk or text with you. Download the free Dutchess County HELPLINE app for iPhone or Android devices for an easy way to connect.

Our Mobile Crisis Team is available to come to you or your loved one when you need help – any hour, anywhere. These trained professionals are available to anyone, regardless of ability to pay, and provide help and assistance as well as connections to resources necessary to move toward recovery. Contact them through HELPLINE (845-485-9700).

Law enforcement from throughout the county are taking part in Crisis Intervention Training, learning how to effectively interact with those dealing with behavioral health and substance abuse issues and how to divert them to the help they need rather than having to bring them to jail.

Our Stabilization Center, currently under construction and expected to open early next year, is a critical addition to our efforts. The center will enable the Mobile Crisis Team and law enforcement to bring individuals to de-escalate and stabilize, rather than taking them to emergency rooms or, in many cases, jail. Individuals will get the help they need 24 hours a day, 7 days a week in safe place, where a coalition of community partners will provide necessary treatment resources.

Inventory and monitor your medicine cabinet. Pain medications can be addicting and often those who become addicted turn to heroin as a cheap alternate. Dispose of leftover medication once the condition it was prescribed for is resolved to avoid the possibility of addiction and ensure it does not end up in the hands of those for whom it was not prescribed. Prescription drop boxes for safe and responsible disposal are available throughout the county. For locations, see the Department of Behavioral & Community Health website, dutchessny.gov/dbch - "Preventing Substance Abuse" tab.

Take a Mental Health First Aid class. Learn more about this problem and be willing to talk about it. There is a great deal of stigma and shame surrounding addiction, pushing those struggling into hiding and unable to ask for help. The shame can be life-threatening and has serious impact on the addict's family and friends. Until we all feel comfortable talking about this problem and seeking help, things will not change. Mental Health First Aid is free and open to the public or any community group; more than 1,500 individuals have been trained already. Call 845-485-9700 for information.

Talk to your children. Let your child know at an early age what you expect from him or her, regarding drinking and drug use. Research shows parents' expectations, especially with younger children, have a significant impact. Tell them you do not approve of alcohol or drug use. If your child is using alcohol or other substances, contact HELPLINE for resources. Many local schools have Student Assistance Counselors available to provide counseling to students who are using or at risk of using. The Council on Addiction Prevention and Education (capedc.org) also has Recovery Coaches available to provide encouragement and support free of charge. Dutchess County provides support for Second Step, a program in local school districts that teaches children and young teens social-emotional skills, such as how to deal with anger or anxiety. In middle school, the program focuses on skills important in bullying prevention and substance abuse prevention.

Get trained to use Narcan. Narcan is an opioid overdose reversal medication used to revive individuals who have overdosed. To date, nearly 1,600 people have been trained in the life-saving measure. There are frequent trainings and all participants are provided with a free Narcan kit. To find out more, call 845-486-3414.

Make your voice heard. The collective voices of our community must be heard on a federal, state and local level to stress the importance of funding for prevention services and to ensure adequate treatment services that are easy to access without the barriers caused by stigma or the lack of insurance.

No one is immune to this epidemic, but we can come together as community to combat it. Let us get past the stigma and work together to find solutions. Prevention and treatment do work. Recovery is possible. But we must all have hope, work together and do our part.




